Do I have to take part?

Although the comparative judgement activity is a mandatory part of the course, your participation in the study is voluntary. You can choose to opt out of the study via the Week 1 e-assessment quiz. If you do decide to take part, you can withdraw at any time, without giving a reason.

Every question on the survey is optional and you can skip over any questions you do not want to answer. You can withdraw from the survey at any time by closing the window. If you want to withdraw your responses after submitting them, we will do our best to find and remove them from the dataset. However, because the survey is anonymous, this might not be possible.

What will happen to my data?

Your data will be held and stored in accordance with the University's privacy policy. You can find information about the University's responsibilities for data protection and your rights under data protection legislation in the University's privacy notice.

Your data will not be held for longer than ten years.

What will happen to the results of the project?
